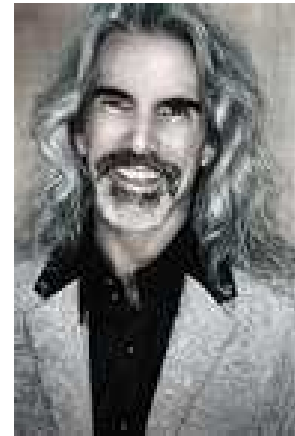

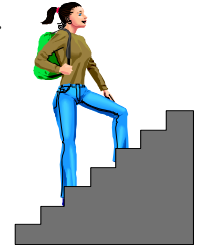

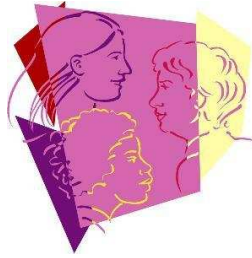

BLUEFIELD COLLEGE OPEN HOUSE

Bluefield College will host its second of three Fall Open House events for prospective students and their families, Saturday, November 6.

Titled Encounter Bluefield, the Open House will begin with registration at 9:45 a.m. in Harman Chapel, followed by a BC Family Assembly at 10:00 a.m. that will acquaint visiting students with the Bluefield College culture and atmosphere.

Bluefield College is a four-year higher education institution in southwest Virginia that strives to serve students through a Christ-centered liberal arts education. In an effort to challenge students both intellectually and spiritually, Bluefield College couples academic education and a diverse Christian environment. The college is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS), and integrates education, service, and local and global community development into its programs. Opportunities abound for students looking to grow through internships, mission opportunities, and travel abroad programs.

Students and their families will be given the opportunity to learn more about Bluefield College during the November 6 Encounter Bluefield event. Current Student Ambassadors will offer campus tours for prospective families at 10:40 a.m. that will showcase the new East River Residence Hall, SMART classrooms equipped with high-technology equipment, Easley Library, the Cox Visual Arts Center, and other facilities.

Also on the Encounter Bluefield schedule will be an Academic and Organizations Fair at 11:30 a.m., which will display Bluefield College's 22 majors of study, including business, biology/pre-med, communications, teacher education, exercise science, fine arts, criminal justice, and forensic science. Lunch will follow the Academic Fair at noon. Afterward, students and parents will be able to ask questions to a panel of Bluefield College students, staff members, and faculty during a session called Bluefield College 360. For students interested in music or athletics, meeting sessions, tryouts and auditions will be made available at the conclusion of the Open House. Students wanting to meet one-on-one with a professor will also have that opportunity during the day.

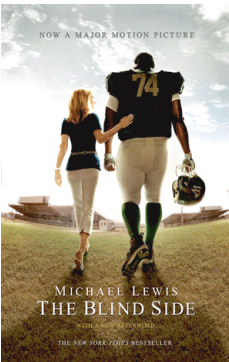

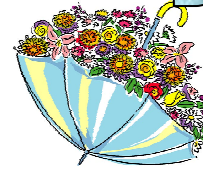

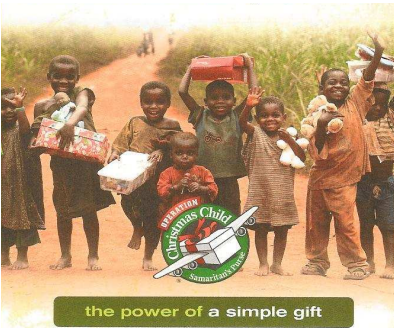
SHOEBOX MINISTRY

Principle Function:

- Preferred Bachelors degree or working toward a degree in Education or Divinity with preference given to applicants with higher education and/or life experience
- A role model for the youth with a strong vibrant walk with Jesus Christ
- Be available to minister to parents to discuss issues related to their youth and encourage them to participate in youth activities
- Use creative means to stay in touch with the members and their parents, including the bulletin, Beacon, telephone, mail, email, and other electronic means
- Maintain a high level of professionalism
- Interact with contemporaries for ministry synergy (Be a team player)
- Have a servant's heart with a leader's mind
- A member of Wytheville Baptist Church if at all possible
- Work 10-12 hours per week

Ministry to Youth Leadership:

- Work with the Nominating Committee to enlist a balance of men and women youth workers.
- Lead quarterly leadership meetings with youth Ministry Teams and provide mission/outreach opportunities in cooperation with the church Outreach Ministry Team
- Provide training opportunities in church and/or at state and national levels (i.e. Ridgecrest and Eagle Eyrie)
- Work directly with the church staff and leadership council to integrate activities into the whole of the church offerings

Other Responsibilities:

- Attend Church Leadership Council whenever possible or prepare a calendar of activities and suggestions to be presented by someone else.
- Draw up a yearly budget for youth ministry. Submit it to the finance committee and administer the approved budget within the guidelines and procedures of the church.
- Serve under the direct supervision and guidance of the Pastor and the Personnel Committee within the established and approved guidelines.
- Maintain and keep current a file of all programs, activities and events, which have been developed as a part of this ministry.
- Adhere to the church guidelines for the use of the church van.
- Stay informed about denominational goals as they relate to the local church and its programs.
- Upon resignation, a notice of two weeks is requested and upon termination, four weeks will be given.
