

REV. JAMES AND ANGIE DENTON, JR.

Rev. James B. Denton, Jr. was born in Tarboro, North Carolina in 1951. He and his wife, Angie, have been married 30 years. They have two grown sons, Ben, 29, and his wife, Beth, live in Roanoke; Casey, 27, lives in Canada. Rev. Denton has 24 years of Pastoral experience and a heart for hands-on ministry. Angie is his true partner in ministry.

Rev. Denton's Testimony

I was raised in church all my life. I accepted Jesus as my savior at the age of nine. Like most young adults, I drifted away from my faith, but in 1977 I recommitted myself to the Lord and surrendered my life into the full time ministry. At that time, I went back to school. I attended Bluefield College where I received my undergraduate degree and met my partner in ministry and life, Angie. We married in June 1981 and then I immediately began seminary. I graduated Southeastern Theological Seminary in 1986. I have served the Lord in youth work, as minister of education, and pastor. I feel God has helped me to mature as a believer, as a leader, and He has blessed me with 30 years of service for Him.

Rev. Denton's Statement on Ministry

Loving God and loving our neighbors as ourselves are the commandments that Jesus said are the most important. Ministry is about finding the way that God intends us to live and to love others in the world.

One of the things I have learned in recent years is that passion is an important part of the ministry. A congregation needs to be passionate about being a community of faith in order to flourish. A large part of the ministry of being a pastor to a small congregation is to be passionate about being a pastor and helping the members of the congregation discover what their passions are. Out of these passions come the ministry of the congregation to the community and the work of Christ in a corner of the world.

I am passionate about preaching, teaching, meaningful worship, and helping people find their way. Making the Bible relevant and understandable to 21st century people with busy lives is something I love to do. Ordained ministry is helping people find God's will for their lives, providing information and opinion, discussing possibilities, and being there to comfort the losses and celebrate the successes.

Music Notes

O WORSHIP THE KING 1833 **BAPTIST HYMNAL pg. 16** Lyrics by Robert Grant (1772-1838) Composed by Johann Michael Hayden, younger brother of Joseph Hayden (1737 - 1806)

Charles Grant, director of the East India Company, was respected throughout India as one of Britain's finest statesmen. He was also a deeply committed Christian, an evangelical in the Anglican Church, who used his position in India to encourage missionary expansion there.

In 1778, just as England was reeling from the American Revolution, Charles returned to the British Isles to become a Member of Parliament from Inverness, Scotland,

His son, Robert, six years old at the time, grew up in a world of power, politics, and privilege. But he also grew up as a devout and dedicated follower of Christ. As a young man, Robert attended Magdalene College, Cambridge, and then entered the legal profession. His intelligence and integrity were obvious. He became King's Sergeant in the Court of the Duchy of Lancaster, and, in 1818, he entered Parliament. Among his legislative initiatives was a bill to remove civil restrictions against the Jews.

One day in the early 1830s, as Robert studied Psalm 104, he compared the greatness of the King of kings with the majesty of British royalty. Psalm 104:1 says of God: "O Lord my God, You are very great; You are clothed with honor and majesty." Verses 2 -3 adds that God covers Himself "with light as with a garment" and "makes the clouds His chariot." Verse 5 reminds us that God "laid the foundation of the earth." All of creation reflects God's greatness, verse 24 proclaiming, O Lord, how manifold are Your works!" Verse 31 says, "May the glory of the Lord endure forever."

Robert filled his heart with these verses, and from his pen came one of the most magnificent hymns in Christendom:

> O worship the King, all glorious above, And gratefully sing His power and His love; Our shield and Defender, the Ancient of Days, Pavilioned in splendor and girded with praise.

In 1832, Robert was appointed Judge Advocate General, this hymn was published in 1833, and he was knighted in 1834. Soon thereafter, at age 50, Sir Robert returned to India, land of his early childhood, to be Governor of Bombay. He died there on July 9, 1838. A nearby medical college was built in his honor and named for him. But, his most lasting memorial is this majestic hymn of praise, calling us to worship the King of kings.

The Nellie Bausell Library Notes

October 2011

<u>The Prayer of Jesus: Living the Lord's Prayer</u> by Ken Hemphill is a Bible study kit. Are you living the Lord's Prayer? When Jesus taught His disciples how to pray, did He intend for them to merely recite His prayer on a daily basis; or, did He intend for them to live it? In this book, Dr. Ken Hemphill says, "The Lord's Prayer continues to amaze me, not only because I missed the point for so long, but also because I now realize that it places me right on the cutting edge of kingdom living all day, every day."

Do you want to live a worry free life? Would you like to live a kingdom adventure every day? This study will teach you that everywhere you go and everything you do has kingdom implications—including the car wash, the cleaners, the carpool, or the airport.

This six week study includes an introduction and five weeks of study, The Leaders Kit videos feature an outreach/broadcast promo, an introductory message, and five sessions of teaching by Dr. Hemphill. We don't know where this kit came from, but we do thank the person who left it on the library desk. It is now on the shelf. Sounds like an excellent study.

Facing Death and The Life after is an excellent book by Billy Graham. "If we are in a battle with this enemy called Death, Dr. Graham says, "I believe we should learn about it, in order to know how to confront the dying experience. We need to know how to face that enemy on our own behalf, and how to deal with the inevitable death of loved ones and friends."

"I believe we need to break the conspiracy of silence about this sub-



ject with biblically sound, realistic approach." While the silence has been broken at some levels in recent years, "the Christian perspective is not widely understood," he says. Here he writes with healthy realism but confident hope. "We cannot begin to understand the riddle of death without the guiding knowledge of the Word of God," Dr. Graham concludes. "Outside of the Bible, death will forever remain an unknown phantom, stalking helpless human beings."
